DR. CLARK: The next public hearing is for NSF Site 2, LLC, in the Burns of Allegany County, New York and that's to start now at 7:15 o'clock, May 25th, at the Town of Burns Hall, again, in Main Street at the Village of Canaseraga in the Town of Burns.

Again, my name is Craig Clark and I'm the Executive Director to the Allegany County Industrial Development Agency in connection with the project, which is the subject of this project -- public hearing.

Today I'm holding a public hearing to allow citizens to make a statement for the record involvement of the Agency with a project -- of the proposed project for the benefit of NFS Burns Site 2, LLC, a New York State Limited Liability Company.

The proposed project consists of the following: The acquisition of interest in a portion of approximately 163.53 acres, consisting of two parcels of land located at 1132 State Route 70 and County Route

13A in the Town of Burns in Allegany County, New York collectively called "the land".

The construction of the land of a ground-mounted photovoltaic 5 megawatts solar energy facility includes panels, racking, inverters, electrical cables, battery storage, grid interconnection, site preparation, access roads, and any other required improvements. All said improvements being collectively referred to as the "facility," and the acquisition and the installation thereof of related fixtures, machinery, equipment, and other personal property. All foregoing to constitute a solar electric energy generated facility to be owned and operated by the Company.

The granting of certain financial assistance within the meaning of Section 854-14 of the Act with respect to the foregoing project including potential exemptions from certain sales tax uses,
real property taxes, and real estate transfer taxes and mortgage recording taxes, collectively called "financial assistance."

I intend to provide general information on the Agency's general authority and public purpose to provide assistance to the proposed project. Before discussing the general information opening the public hearing, I'd like to first describe brief details of the project.

The overall construction cost of the project is approximately $\$ 8.7$ million and the estimated cost of the proposed financial assistance of the project are equal to approximately $\$ 401,907$. And the estimated benefits being considered by the Agency are described briefly as follows: Hello.

MS. BANCROFT: I'm sorry.
DR. CLARK: No. We're good. I'm just going through the -- we can talk as
soon as $I$ read through all this, okay?
MS. BANCROFT: Okay.
MS. FREINER: This is a public hearing.

MS. BANCROFT: Pardon?
MS. FREINER: This is a public hearing.

MS. BANCROFT: For the solar?
DR. CLARK: Yes.
MS. BANCROFT: Okay. All right. I wasn't sure because there's nobody here.

DR. CLARK: You'll be our -- you are now.

MS. BANCROFT: Yeah.
DR. CLARK: We're good.
MS. BANCROFT: Yeah. Thank you.
MS. FREINER: Have a seat.
DR. CLARK: I'll now answer any questions. The sales tax exemption is going to be about $\$ 222,000$, mortgage recording tax exemption about 109,000, and real property tax exemption of $\$ 69,000$. The provisions of Chapter 1030 of Laws of

1969 of New York, constituting Title 1 of Article 18-A of the General Municipal Law, Chapter 24 of the consolidated Laws of New York amended, in the Chapter 99 of the 1973 Laws of the State of New York, as amended, and codified as Section 906-a of said General Municipal Law, authorizing the Agency to promote and develop, encourage, and assist in the acquiring, constructing, reconstructing, and improving, maintaining, equipping, and finishing of manufacturing, warehousing, research, commercial, and industrial facilities.

The purpose of this public hearing is pursuant to the Section 859-a of the General Municipal Law any project of more than $\$ 100,000$ to any project, the Agency, among other things, must hold a public hearing. It's financial assistance to be provided by the Agency with respect to the proposed project may exceed $\$ 100,000$ then prior to providing any financial
assistance, you must have a public hearing at the location of the project facility and that's why we're in the Town of Burns. After consideration of the application received from the Company, the members of the Agency adopted a resolution on April 27th, 2023, authorizing the Executive Director to hold this public hearing and the Executive Director of the Agency caused notice of public hearing to be mailed May 12th to the Chief Executive Officers of the Allegany County, the Town of Burns, the Canaseraga School District and it was also published on May 14 th of the "Spectator."

Copies of the public hearing are available on the table here and you have a copy, and unless you object, I'm not going to read the full notice of the public hearing.

MS. FREINER: I demand.
DR. CLARK: Now, be nice. The comments received today at the public
hearing will be presented to the members of the Agency at or prior to the meeting at which the members of the Agency will consider whether to approve the undertaking of the proposed projects.

The notice of the public hearing indicated that written comments could be addressed to myself, Craig R. Clark, Executive Director of the Agency, and no written comments have been received today. I'll open this public hearing at 7:20, and by the way of the operating rules, if you wish to make a public comment, just let me know and unless there's some objection or more people show up, you'll have as much time as you want, but typically we try to keep comments to about three minutes.

I will now ask if there is anyone in attendance who wishes to comment on either the nature of the location of the project, of the proposed financial assistance being contemplated by the Agency, and for the record please state your name and indicate
your comments, so we'll record them and put them in the record. So after that, we are more than willing to discuss -- this is on NSF 2, I'm holding four public hearings. They're all similar projects, so I have to read the same thing four times before the public if that's okay. So anyways, you are more than welcome to ask questions, most of the questions I would be asking about are the financial assistance that the Agency is giving, but if there are questions, please ask them.

MR. BANCROFT: Yeah. So the only question I've have, I talked to a gentleman --

DR. CLARK: Can you tell me your name?

MR. BANCROFT: Brian Bancroft.
DR. CLARK: Brian Bancroft?
MR. BANCROFT: Yes.
DR. CLARK: It will be recorded, but I will write it down, too.

MR. BANCROFT: Okay. Last year, I talked to the gentleman about the project down here about pasturing the sheep on it. That's the main thing I am concerned with.

DR. CLARK: It's about?
MR. BANCROFT: Pasturing the sheep are on.

MS. BANCROFT: Pasturing the sheep.
DR. CLARK: Oh, the pasturing the sheep. Have they talked to you about that?

MS. BANCROFT: That's the EDS site? We're up here on this site.

MS. FREINER: Do you want --
MR. BANCROFT: Yeah. I don't care where they're going.

MS. BANCROFT: We don't care, we'll take them.

MS. FREINER: Okay.
MS. BANCROFT: Okay.
MR. BANCROFT: Yeah. They did put something in the paper for the one over here.

MS. FREINER: They did.
MR. BANCROFT: Yeah. I know they're going to have one here. They've got one down the road all ready, that's a different company, I think.

MS. BANCROFT: Yeah. That would be --

MS. FREINER: This is Norbut Solar Farms and you'll see NS -- NSF in the --

DR. CLARK: The company name is NSF as far as who's holding the title but --

MS. BANCROFT: Yes.
DR. CLARK: -- Norbut Solar is the one who is putting in these project.

MS. FREINER: Yes. And Victor
Ciaccia and I think he would be the person that we can contact if you're interested in putting sheep up here. This -- going to go faster.

MR. BANCROFT: Yeah. There's really no sense in putting them back here.

DR. CLARK: I think the record said
we can connect you with them to make sure.
MS. FREINER: Yes.
DR. CLARK: Because I think --
MS. BANCROFT: Are there other solar fields that would require --

DR. CLARK: Actually, NSF has another 20 megawatts down in Angelica.

MR. BANCROFT: On the old golf course.

DR. CLARK: On the old golf course, so, yep, they already have 20 megawatts running, so that's the same purpose. We can talk more about that one.

MS. BANCROFT: No. That's the -- is that you're -- you're affiliated with them.

DR. CLARK: No. I'm -- I'm from the IDA.

MR. BANCROFT: Yeah.
DR. CLARK: I run the Allegany County IDA who was --

MS. BANCROFT: -- oh, okay.
DR. CLARK: -- their just -- we're
just supporting the project by giving them benefits.

MS. BANCROFT: Okay.
DR. CLARK: And we only do that when the benefits -- the town agrees that this is a project that the town has agreed too, but no, I'm not the developer.

MS. BANCROFT: Oh, okay.
DR. CLARK: The developer actually isn't here tonight.

MS. BANCROFT: Okay.
DR. CLARK: That's why I said we can connect you with the developers.

MS. BANCROFT: Okay.
MR. BANCROFT: Yeah, and
that -- that's who I need it -- like I
said I talked with a gentleman who was going to -- they were going to do the one over here --

DR. CLARK: The large one.
MR. BANCROFT: -- and here.
DR. CLARK: Right.
MS. FREINER: Yes.

MR. BANCROFT: And then supposedly their doing one around --

DR. CLARK: Yes. That's correct.
MS. FREINER: Yes.
MR. BANCROFT: And --
DR. CLARK: Because they only do large projects.

MR. BANCROFT: -- and he had talked to me about both of them.

MS. FREINER: Yes.
MR. BANCROFT: And then I heard that the projects are down here on 70 now.

DR. CLARK: Okay.
MR. BANCROFT: The last year they mowed them, people gave them crap over that because they mowed it, you know, if you are going to have something green, you know, you got to kind of have something green to mow with.

DR. CLARK: Right.
MR. BANCROFT: So --
MS. BANCROFT: I don't understand why he has to be a zero --

DR. CLARK: I'm sure he would be interested in talking to you because --

MR. BANCROFT: Yeah.
MS. BANCROFT: We -- we --
DR. CLARK: -- having the sheep on the site is to their benefit as well as to yours because then -- then they don't have to mow it.

MR. BANCROFT: Yeah. They don't have to mow it.

MS. FREINER: And can I have you --
DR. CLARK: Write down your contact.
MS. FREINER: -- I know where you live, but if you could put down your phone number, where we can have them contact you, that would be great.

DR. CLARK: Yeah. The easiest thing to do is having him work with us and the County.

MS. FREINER: Yeah. Yeah.
We -- we -- we would like to see sheep. That's a good thing. That's a good site.

DR. CLARK: And your name is?

MS. BANCROFT: Ruth.
DR. CLARK: Ruth?
MS. BANCROFT: I'm his wife.
DR. CLARK: We just want to make sure who was in attendance that's all.

MS. BANCROFT: Well, if you guys for sure are going to be here, we have --

DR. CLARK: Does she have to go next door for that.

MS. BANCROFT: Thank you very much.
MR. BANCROFT: No. Thank you.
MS. FREINER: Yeah.
DR. CLARK: So whenever we give -- we don't give them any money, but basically give them benefits and so what the benefits are is we give them -- they get some sales tax benefits, they get some mortgage tax benefit, you know, if they want to buy property, and then they get some property tax benefits.

MS. BANCROFT: How long do those last? Are they a permanent thing --

DR. CLARK: No.

MS. BANCROFT: -- as long as the solar field is there or is it --

DR. CLARK: They're -they're -- right now this is a 15-year, right?

MS. FREINER: Yeah.
DR. CLARK: I think it's 15, we have some that go as long as 25.

MS. BANCROFT: Okay.
DR. CLARK: So 15 years, but what happens, just so you know, the land will be fully taxed. So there's no loss of tax revenue to the town --

MS. BANCROFT: Right.
DR. CLARK: -- or the County or anybody. In fact, it should go up because they have to pay full taxes, they have a AG district benefit, they lose that.

MR. BANCROFT: Yeah. It -- it would be considered commercial property.

DR. CLARK: Right. So basically, the tax -- the taxes will go up and then there's a negotiated payment that they
give the town, and they give to the County, but -- so really the benefit is everyone gets more money not less money. The one argument sometimes is that they don't get as much, but they still -- they wouldn't have built it otherwise.

MS. BANCROFT: Right.
MS. FREINER: Yeah. There has to be a benefit for them, too.

MS. BANCROFT: Now, does any of the energy that's generated, does that stay here or does it --

DR. CLARK: That goes into the grid.
MS. BANCROFT: It goes just into the grid.

DR. CLARK: So obviously, you won't be using it, but you wouldn't know it because, you know --

MS. BANCROFT: Right.
DR. CLARK: -- just like with
any -- any power, it goes to the closest place first.

MR. BANCROFT: Technically, we would
be using --
DR. CLARK: Correct.
MR. BANCROFT: (Inaudible).
DR. CLARK: Yeah. That too if you're green, you're already on it.

MR. BANCROFT: I -- I don't mean to brag, but ten years ago we signed up for a hundred percent green.

DR. CLARK: Right.
MR. BANCROFT: So it costs me --
MS. BANCROFT: Well, at the time I was like --

DR. CLARK: But now it costs you -- if you signed up now, it should cost you less, you'd get about 10 percent --

MR. BANCROFT: Yeah. I don't know with the electric company, because they're like oh, you've been signed up for so long you were supposed to be getting it --

MS. BANCROFT: Yeah. Our credit to our account was supposed to be credited. We never got anything until it -- shut off
notice a week ago so it's like --
DR. CLARK: Yeah. The electric company --

MS. BANCROFT: What is going on with them?

MR. BANCROFT: They -- they, like don't send any bills.

DR. CLARK: Okay.
MS. BANCROFT: Yeah.
MR. BANCROFT: But anyway, I -- I signed up for the hundred percent green electric --

DR. CLARK: Right.
MR. BANCROFT: -- back then, and technically, I -- according to the electric company everything goes into the grid --

DR. CLARK: Right.
MR. BANCROFT: -- and then, you
know, my portion of the electric
supposedly comes from the grid, you know --

DR. CLARK: Right.

MR. BANCROFT: -- the outright grid --

DR. CLARK: Sure.
MR. BANCROFT: -- it's a hundred percent, but anyway. And part of my deal was years ago, when they first came in with the solar thing in the window, in particular, people complained about them, and they're like, oh, my god, and I was like, well, actually I think there are a good thing. So if -- I got to be willing to back it up a little bit, you know, what I mean, if I'm saying it's a good thing I got to put the money into it.

DR. CLARK: Are there any other comments on the project itself?

MS. BANCROFT: No.
MR. BANCROFT: No. I don't think so.

DR. CLARK: Okay.
MR. BANCROFT: Other than, how far back does it all go, is it all --

MS. FREINER: There's a map over
there.
DR. CLARK: There's a map over there, all right.

MS. FREINER: It's right here. It goes --

MR. BANCROFT: Okay. Okay.
MS. BANCROFT: -- and it
goes -- look, all the (inaudible) --
MR. BANCROFT: Yeah. Like all the open farmland.

MS. BANCROFT: Yeah.
MR. BANCROFT: Okay.
MS. FREINER: Yeah. They're going to take down some trees, too.

MS. BANCROFT: This is something that concerns me, now is the loss of the arable farmland.

MS. FREINER: That's bad -- that's -- that's the place where that should go. That is not good farmland and a lot of it is very wet.

MS. BANCROFT: Okay. Yeah. Jim has farmed that, $I$ think Jeremy tried to farm
it, it's --
MR. BANCROFT: Yeah. It's hay ground at best.

MS. FREINER: Yeah. You've probably been up there?

MR. BANCROFT: Years and years ago, I think my -- my cousin Eddie and my Uncle Roy bailed some hay out there.

MS. FREINER: Okay. Yep.
MR. BANCROFT: I went up to help them get some hay up there.

MS. FREINER: Yeah.
MR. BANCROFT: Like I said it's hay, but it's probably hay ground at best.

MS. FREINER: Yeah. And you're right. And it is very wet.

MR. BANCROFT: Yeah.
MS. BANCROFT: It probably needs to be drained or --

MR. BANCROFT: Yeah. Yes. It got to be -- if they were really that super interested in farming, we would have to (inaudible) --

MS. FREINER: You would.
MR. BANCROFT: -- and stuff, you know, but --

MS. FREINER: Yeah. You would have to put a lot of money into it, too.

MR. BANCROFT: It would -- but once the solar unit are backing it, that would be perfect place to pasture.

MS. FREINER: It would.
DR. CLARK: Certainly --
MS. BANCROFT: But that -- that would be -- that is the ideal place to put it. If it's going to go on farmland that's the place to put it.

MR. BANCROFT: Yeah. Yes. Like the one down here that's my only complaint about that one is they -- that is pretty decent farmland down here that their covering, but it is what it is.

MS. FREINER: It is what it is.
MR. BANCROFT: Yep. I mean, you know, if their going --

DR. CLARK: Well, if there's no
other comments --
MR. BANCROFT: Yeah. I know.
DR. CLARK: -- I mean -- I can close the public hearing. I got one more to do. So if there's no other comments about this particular public hearing, we'll close this at 7:30 and we'll open the next public hearing. Well, two more to do.

MR. BANCROFT: Two more today?
DR. CLARK: There's more projects. How they do these small winter -- or solar projects, they do call them a small project like what they are, they have to be no bigger than 5 megawatts. So there's actually three 5 megawatts and 3 megawatts, all -- all together there 18 megawatts, but they're four projects.

MR. BANCROFT: I get you.
(Whereupon, the hearing was concluded
at approximately 7:28 p.m.)
